First Congregational Church To Host 34th Annual WCA Meeting

First Congregational Church will host the 34th Annual Meeting of the Wisconsin Congregational Association on Friday, April 22nd and Saturday the 23rd. The Association is a group of 33 Wisconsin Congregational Churches, organized on April 27, 1968 and bound together in faith, freedom, and fellowship. Annual meetings are held to conduct such business as may be required and to renew the bond of congregational fellowship that links the member churches together.

The main projects of the association are to sponsor and provide leadership for the annual summer youth camps at Camp Lucerne and to publish the *Wisconsin Congregationalist* bulletin which provides news items about member churches and articles of interest concerning the association and it's activities.

Copies of the bulletin may be found in the literature rack in the narthex of First Congregational Church.

Information regarding the Annual Meeting may be found in the Spring, 1994, issue of the bulletin. Forms for registering for the meetings and the schedule of events are included.

The Boards of Benevolences and Church Relations, Christian Fellowship, and Deacons, with Art Kletti as chairperson, have made extensive preparations for the meeting and are hoping for a large attendance. Plan to attend the meeting and meet your fellow congregationalists from around the state.

Question and Answer

Why has the church refused to divulge the individual salaries, bonuses, and benefits of the ministers?

At the past Annual Meeting, there was an itemized list of the exact salary and medical benefits of each employee of the church for 1993 and the proposed 1994 budget. These were handed out before the vote was taken on the budget. This information is available in the church office if you were not at the Annual Meeting. There are no bonus payments to any employee and no life insurance. The ministers receive four weeks of vacation, other employees' vacation times are based on the number of years employed. There are seven paid holidays and six sick days per year which may be accumulated to a maximum of 60

Getting to Know Rev. Strassburger

Reverand John H. Strassburger came to First Congregational Church in 1991 as the Minister of Pastoral Care. Rev. Strassburger was ordained in 1974 and served in many capacities including as pastor to local churches, and as a clinical chaplin at a couple of state hospitals. From those experiences, he decided to go back to school to obtain his Master of Theology in Pastoral Counseling and then his Doctorate in Education. Rev. Strassburger then served in many pastoral counseling/care capacities before receiving a call from First Congregational Church. He says he liked the position because it was a pastoral care ministry in a local church - a

function which he believes to be essential to the ministry of a large church and a position which made good use of his training.

His primary responsibilities to FCC include hospital, homebound, and nursing home visitations. (There are approximately 130 members at 25 different facilities plus individual homes which he visits.) Rev. Strassburger also works closely with the Board of Congregational Care, serves on the Mayfair Interfaith Board, is the Program Coordinator for the Wauwatosa Ministerial Association, and serves on the Board of the Congregational Home. He is current-

ly very interested in gerentology, spiritual care, and local church ministries. In the future, he hopes to help give birth to a "Shepherd's Center," which would serve as a continuing education center for older adults.

Rev. Strassburger's wife, Gwen works at M&I in corporate finance. They have two daughters, Jenny, 22 and Julie, 20. Jenny attends UW-LaCrosse and will graduate in May with a Psychology degree. Julie is at North Central College and is studying Spanish and Psychology.

Rev. Strassburger enjoys concerts, the theatre, reading and traveling.
