

1994 N.A.P.F. Conference Celebrates God in Our Lives

The cozy but largely deserted campus of Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa suddenly came to life on the afternoon of Sunday, June 26, when approximately 230 high-school-age Congregationalists from around the country converged for the 1994 N.A.P.F. conference. Over the three and one-half days, the PF'ers shared a spectacular experience of spiritual and social renewal.

The conference theme was "God is the Gift within Me," focusing on the many and varied gifts that God has given us, and on how God is constantly present and active in our lives. Chap Clark - a nationally know speaker, authority on youth ministry, professor at Denver Theological Seminary and author of The Next Time I Fall in Love and several other youth ministry volumes - was the featured speaker. His talks helped stir PF'ers to take a fresh look at their relationship with God and Christ, their level of commitment, responsibility, compassion, service as disciples, their relationships with peers and their own giftedness. Small discussion groups (of approximately eight PF'ers and one to two

The core

ideas behind the theme were also communicated through the morning watch and vespers services, led by N.A.P.F. officers including Kate Frkovich of FCC- Wauwatosa. These devotional times included a dramatic reenactment of the Prodigal Son parable, skits that emphasized the importance of never being too busy or too self-absorbed to make time for God and your neighbors, "in-character" monologues from the viewpoints of biblical figures, and an emotionally and spiritually super-charged sharing by the officers of their personal faith pilgrimages.

A number of other special activities added yet another dimension of fun, fellowship, and excitement to the conference. Monday evening featured performances by Christian comedian Scott Gregory and Christian recording star Ken Medema. Tuesday evening included a casual yet meaningful time of inter-generational fellowship with the adults attending the delegate meeting, plus the annual N.A.P.F. Talent Show. Wednesday evening featured the banquet; a bidding of

With enthusiastic direction from Amy Ryan, music teacher at Benjamin Franklin School in Milwaukee, the children performed for their parents and grandparents on the last day of Bible School. With their animal costumes (designed by Ddg Wakefield) and the nave still adorned with flowered arches from Children's Sunday, the atmosphere was festive as the children shared their songs and smiles. Taking with them paper-plate fish and handmade beaded necklaces, we hope the children will also keep good memories of happy times learning about God by "asking the animals."
