In addition to enjoying a wide variety of music, Mary Lou likes outdoor activities such as


hiking, biking, swimming and cross-country skiing. She also enjoys traveling to visit friends and family, and antiquing.

Women's International Bible Study Program Comes to FCC

Beginning on January 9, First Congregational Church will become the new host of Bible Study Fellowship International (BSF). BSF is an ecumenical, in-depth, Bible study program. Its purpose is to help people learn to study and enjoy the Bible to develop a vibrant relationship with the Lord.

The six-year course studies six different topics. They are: Genesis, Matthew, the Life of Moses, John, History of Israel and Minor Prophets, and the Life and Letters of Paul. They are currently in the middle of John. This Milwaukee-area group, which has members representing 50 different churches, outgrew their last meeting place, and would like to keep growing. The group meets weekly from

9:15-11:15 a.m. The first Tuesday of every month is an introductory class. Except for during the intro. class, child care is available. Children ages 2-5 study the same topics as the moms.

Marsha Bolan will lecture each week. In addition, there are daily questions for the women to study, discussion groups, and notes from the lecture distributed each week.

Throughout the world, there are nearly 1000 classes available to men and women, but this is the only class currently available in the Milwaukee area. Any woman who is interested is encouraged to attend to get more information. Questions, call the office, 258-7375. ■

Care Board Begins New Programs

The Congregational Care Board is undertaking some new approaches in its service of our Church family. The Board will approach its ministry from four angles: Ministry of Prayer, Ministry to the Bereaved, Ministry to the Sick and Shut-In, and Ministry to those in Nursing Homes. As the Board works to develop these programs it will also begin to serve as a "clearinghouse" for existing ones so that the various ministries of the Church can be coordinated.

The first of these ministries to be implemented is that of Prayer. The members of the Congregational Care Board are all agreed that this ministry will serve as the foundation for everything else that is done. As Christians we're instructed to "pray always" both by the Lord Jesus (Luke 18:1) and by Saint Paul (I Thessalonians 5:17), one of the ways

we can accomplish this is by praying for one another. So volunteers drawn from the Care Board and the whole congregation will pray daily for the specific requests of our people.

A special "Book Of Intentions" ('intention' is an ancient way of describing a prayer request) will be available in the narthex before services on Sunday, and in the Memorial Chapel during the week, for people to list their requests. If one wishes to remain anonymous it is suggested that he/she simply put down "For a Special Intention;" God knows - and that's all that matters. The Ministry of Prayer will begin its work with the "Watch Night Service" on New Year's Eve.

Highlighting the menu was roast beef, Yorkshire pudding with plum

pudding and hard sauce for dessert. Everyone received a Christmas stocking containing four gifts. The historic symbolism of each of the gifts was explained by Rev. Steve. The bright color of the orange represents Jesus as Light of the World. The blood-red and snow white of the apple reminds us of Christ as our Savior who died for us. The nuts, as gathered and stored by squirrels for the winter, symbolize the wisdom of nature. The candy cane made of scarce and precious sugar is shaped in the form of St. Nick's staff.

Ms. Dean's presentation, a Celebration of Christmas in Art, began and ended with music. She guided the audience through works by numerous artists spanning several centuries. The featured paintings depicted the Annunciation, the



Nativity, and the two Adorations of Christ. Ms. Dean pointed out the variety in the many ways the artists interpreted and depicted the emotions of Mary, the age of Joseph, and the various settings and backgrounds particular to the time each painting was done. The evening provided a wonderful beginning for our Christmas season. ■




Personnel Committee Kept Busy in '95

During the past year, the Church's Personnel Committee has been very busy. In addition to being actively involved in all the staff changes which have occurred recently, the Committee has been working hard behind the scenes as well.

After several years of effort, the Committee completed the writing of a 27-page Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual, which contains sections on employment, compensation, benefits, training, and general information. The Manual consolidates all of the Church's personnel practices into one document, the receipt of which is acknowledged in writing by each employee of the Church.

Also, in consultation with the Church staff, the Committee has developed written Position Descriptions for each and every paid position. These descriptions

detail the duties and responsibilities of each position, as well as its ecclesiastical and payroll status. Each Position Description is approved by the Senior Minister, the Chairperson of the Personnel Committee and the Moderator.

Finally, Performance Evaluation procedures and forms were developed and designed in order to establish a formal appraisal process for all paid Church staff members. The procedure calls for all staff members to receive a written performance evaluation from their supervisors between May 1 and June 30 of each year. The performance of the Senior Minister is to be evaluated by a special Evaluation Committee, consisting of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Past Moderator, and Chairpersons of the Board of Deacons, Board of Trustees, and Personnel

Committee. All evaluations will be reviewed by the Personnel Committee and stored in the Church's personnel files.

The Personnel Committee is a standing committee of the Council, the functions of which are to advise, inform, recommend to Council, Officers, Boards, and Committees on all matters pertaining to administrative personnel procedure and policy, and to confer and counsel with the staff on matters pertaining to their relationship with the congregation and each other. Appointed by the Moderator subject to ratification by the Council, members of this year's committee are Stew Davis - Chairperson, Gary Kebbekus, Jeff Kelling, Chuck Krull, Cathy Lewis, Bob Ornst, and Mary York. ■

1995 Christmas Offering

The Board of Benevolences and Church Relations has selected the Honduran Congregational Mission as this year's recipient for the special Christmas offering. The mission is directed by Rev. Edsel Bodden who has visited our congregation the last two years. This mission continues to serve the Honduran people with the medical clinic, the sewing and carpentry schools, the feeding stations for pregnant women and young children and other programs and services which improve the living conditions of the people. Local families are given practical teaching in cooking, nutrition and hygiene.

In 1988, our congregation funded the construction of the medical clinic. The clinic operates five days a

week to bring medical treatment to an area where such treatment was almost non-existent. Patients pay the equivalent of one U.S. dollar for medical care from the clinic. The latest addition to the medical clinic this year has been a dental clinic which our Sunday School children supported with the collection of toothbrushes during October.

To date, the results of this new clinic have been outstanding, but such a venture is costly. Funds are needed to purchase medicines and supplies and to support the medical staff at the clinic. In the near future, the Board of Benevolences hopes to sponsor a trip to Honduras to participate in the mission's various projects and see our funding at work. ■
