Dialogue, healing service welcomes veterans and families

As you've heard in the media, our returning military men and women are suffering in alarming numbers from various manifestations of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and other war-related trauma, often surfacing as suicide, drug abuse and alcoholism. While various physical and emotional support services are available to vets and their families, there often is not good spiritual support available.

The Wauwatosa Minister's Association is sponsoring a healing service for vets and their families where they might come and experience the balm of worship and spiritual community. Our church is hosting this event on the Saturday after Veteran's Day, Nov. 15.

A dialogue precedes the service, featuring Dr. John Zemler of Marquette University. Dr. Zemler is a doctoral-level theologian and military veteran who encourages the church to offer its healing arts to veterans. Dr. Zemler himself has PTSD and has been healed—not necessarily cured—through the Biblical witness and the church's liturgy.

The public will be invited to this as well as vets and we especially encourage FCC members to come out and support this ministry of healing.

Saturday Nov. 15 at FCC 5 p.m. Dr. John D. Zemler

Dr. John D. Zemler Marquette University

speaks on Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) among veterans. Dr. Zemler is both an academic theologian (with a Ph.D. in Biblical Theology) and a military veteran. He speaks explicitly of his own struggles with

PTSD, and the need to better welcome returning veterans who often bear the pain of PTSDrelated symptoms.

Children are welcome! It is a wonderful way for them to use their energy and give something back to the church. They can work with their parents, other adults, or youth depending on their level of independence.


The schedule is:





November - Time to Remember



"Now thank we all our God With heart and hands and voices, who wondrous things hath done, In whom His world rejoices..."

If it's November, then it's time for Congregationalists to once again reflect on our heritage as the Lord's free people. We've talked enough about our history to know that our roots are more than the 'Pilgrims,' though they still have the most romantic appeal for us. Still, it's good to take the time to look back and to think about whence we've come so that we can look ahead to where we're headed. Many folks have said to me, "What is Congregationalism?" Well, it's important for us to remember what the learned Congregational historian, Rev. Arvel M. Steece, has said, "There was a time when people did not call us 'the Congressional Church!"

Our Congregational Way is a coming together of two strains of the Puritans, the movement to 'purify' or bring the English Church into the fullness of the Reformation. Some felt the need to separate from what they perceived as

an impure Church, while others wanted to stay in the Church and work for reform from inside. American Congregationalism is the result of those separatist and non-separatist strains coming together and is expressed in our great charter document The Cambridge Platform (1648). At one point the Congregational Churches dominated the American religious scene, but this shifted during the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

The Congregationalists remained prominent, however, and influenced American government and education on many fronts. From the nineteenth century on, the Congregationalists were committed to a broadly inclusive, ecumenical stance. Standing on the graves of the Pilgrims at Burial Hill, Plymouth in 1865 they declared, "We will work with anyone who owns the Lordship of Jesus Christ." This openness led to an orientation toward organic mergers, which eventually led to the merger controversy of the 1940s and 1950s. The result of the 'merger' was the United Church of Christ, the Conservative Congregational Christian Conference and our own National Association of Congregational Christian Churches. Two denominational bodies came together and four - if we count the non-aligned Churches - came out of it.

out of this rich history. Eleven pioneers who had come from Massachusetts, upstate New York and other parts of New England brought their faith with them to the Wisconsin woods. In March of 1842 they gathered in the Gilbert family cabin and "gathered" the First Congregational Church of Wauwatosa. They were served for a while by Rev. John J. Miter from the Plymouth Congregational Church in Milwaukee and the Rev. Hiram Marsh from the American Home Missionary Society and worshipped in various homes. In 1845 the Rev. Luther Clapp, fresh out of Andover Seminary and newly married, came out under the auspices of the American Home Missionary Society. In 1848 the congregation was able to call him as their "settled" minister. (There is a wonderful story of how Deacon Richard Gilbert, when informed that people didn't think they could support a full-time settled minister, told fellow Church members that he would be putting his farm up for sale and moving back East. He said that he couldn't stay in a place where Christian faith wasn't a priority. Everyone present was moved by his commitment and, surprisingly, more than enough money was found to support the new minister!) Rev. Clapp served the congregation and the community tire-

lessly, including helping to start Wauwatosa's first high school in the parsonage living room, until 1874. He then served as the "district evangelist" helping to start and support other Congregational Churches until his retirement. He died in 1894 as a member of First Congregational Church.

The Church purchased land from the Hart family in 1853 and constructed their first meeting house on it that same year. The building was added to in 1870 and was redone in Queen Anne (also sometimes known as carpenter gothic) style in the 1880s. The new nave was started in 1919 and occupied in 1921. The education and office building was added in 1959. Over the years the building has been well-used for both Church and community functions (including the first basketball games for Wauwatosa High School being played in our Social Hall!). We continue the "benevolence of the building," opening our doors to a number of community groups who benefit from our facility at little or no cost.

Now that we've done the condensed history, what's the future for Wauwatosa's 'first' Church? If, as someone once said, "past is prologue," the future is bright. Over the years First Church has been committed to the service of God, to the growth of its members in spiri-
