## Annual Meeting Update

I had the opportunity to represent our church as the delegate to the NACCC meeting in Anchorage, Alaska, June 24th to the 29th. Rev. Szymanski and Harry Holz were the alternate delegates. Rev. Szymanski is a member of, and active in, the Division for Ministry, and Harry Holz is a member of the NA's Executive Committee. The host church was the First Congregational Church of Anchorage.

The national meeting was highlighted by three important lectures. Rev. Dr. Beth Bingham gave the keynote address. Dr. Jeffrey Kuan gave a three-part Bible lecture, and Rev. Wayne Riggs presented the Congregational lecture, "Covenant — Centerpiece of the Congregational Way." He stressed the importance of the Three F's in Congregationalism: Faith, Freedom in our individual relationship with God, and Fellowship. Several workshops were held, including one on Long Range Planning and one on Contemporary Worship/Music.

Eighty-three churches were represented at the meeting by over 200 attendees. Three matters of significance were brought to the floor for action. First, the meeting authorized the sale of the Oak Creek headquarters building and the move of headquarters to a smaller facility. A committee study found the headquarters building to be in need of costly major repairs and too large for the NA's current needs. Second, the definition of Active Membership in the by-laws was amended to include the requirement that, to remain an Active Member, a church must make an annual financial contribution to the Shared Ministry Fund. Third, the body approved the Executive Committee recommendation that the Fair Share and Fair Share plus amounts be raised to \$13 and \$15 per member respectively.

Rev. Rick Koch, who grew up in our church, and his wife, Mary, were meaningful participants in the Sunday morning communion service. They send their greetings to all!



New officers were elected, and the budget was adopted as presented by the Budget Committee. On Sunday evening, the Executive Committee, in conjunction with the NA's Strategic Planning Committee, held an open forum giving delegates the opportunity to ask questions about the NA's actions and policies. On the final evening, the adults gathered with the junior and senior high school youth, who had been at their conference at a nearby college doing volunteer projects for the week.

In summary, the fact that there was an Annual Meeting and the dedication of the attendees who gathered to do the business of the NA is most important. Our church remains a very significant member of the NA. We have to remain intimately involved in all of its future decisions.

Although we were in meetings most of the time, we did take time at either end to explore Anchorage, visit the glaciers and nearby parks, and sample some of their delicious salmon and halibut.

Thank you for the opportunity to represent our church.

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## ASP Mission Trip Update

As we left the parking lot on Saturday, June 19, none of the 23 teen and adult volunteers could fully grasp the journey that we were embarking on. Departing with four large vans filled with sleeping bags, tools, work boots, suitcases, and food, we were still uncertain if we truly had everything we would need.

On Sunday, we marveled at the beauty of southern West Virginia as we drew closer to what was to be our temporary home for the week, Summers Middle School, located in the town of Hinton, which is woven into the mountains of Appalachia along the scenic New River. We settled in to our new accommodations and after a brief new group orientation, the two other churches that we would be sharing space with arrived from Yorktown, Virginia and Cary, North Carolina. After getting acquainted with the other churches, eating dinner, and taking care of evening chores, our three work crews received their detailed work assignments.



Team "Thriller" was assigned to an elderly couple who needed to add a room to their home so that their granddaughter could come and live with them. She is currently in the care of Children's Protective Services. Team "I'll Be There" was assigned an unmarried gentleman who had served the community as an EMT for 18 years. He needed his porch roof repaired and a new sub floor installed in his laundry room. Team "Earth Song" was assigned an elderly woman who lives alone but receives frequent visits from her family. She was in need of a wheel chair ramp and a new porch.

With assignments in hand, every team selected a teen delegate to visit the job site with their work crew leader and an ASP staff member. They met the family they would be serving and got a better idea of the work that we would have to accomplish. Each teen delegate returned with enthusiastic accounts of their families and job sites. Heading out for our workday on Monday, as we drove up the mountain, we somehow knew in our hearts that we were meant to be there. Although working harder than ever in extreme heat, every member of the work crews developed a special relationship with their families. On Thursday night at the family picnic, it was wonderful to meet some of the other families that we had heard so much about over the course of the week and spend time enjoying each others' company.

By Friday morning, familiar with the daily routine, we loaded up quickly as we were anxious to complete what we could at our job sites. Yet, we were filled with sadness knowing that it was our last workday. We wanted to give more, to learn more, and to share more with our families. We had started the week wanting to serve, and yet, we somehow received far more from them during the course of the week.

We will never forget our week in Appalachia, and we are grateful for all of your support and prayers. Our teens worked exceptionally hard this week, were friendly and helpful to everyone, and modeled exemplary behavior that you can be proud of. They truly were living the Covenant. ## Just Be Present



In our prayer life we may often feel we have nothing to say to God. And, as far as praise and thanksgiving, we could feel that our words are inadequate. However, the same may be true when we are with our close friends. Sometimes words just don't convey what we want to share with those we love. In movies we laugh at the moonstruck

lover, but our laughter might well be because we have been there ourselves. Speechless. Wordless. Yet a close friend understands your silence. A close friend will sit at a restaurant table with you – no words uttered – and understand. A close friend will share a fishing boat, or a ball game, or a car ride in friendly (may I say, loving) silence. A lover will hold your hand for an hour – and that is all that need be communicated between you. The same is true in our relationship with Jesus. Sharing silence may be all that is needed. That silence could be the All. So, at a moment in your life, you pass the Memorial Chapel and stop at the door and look in. You feel compelled to enter. But you

do not enter yet because you tell yourself that you have nothing to pray about. Somehow you feel compelled to enter. You still don't have anything to say to God. No thanksgiving. No requests. No offering. But you feel compelled to walk in, and do. You stand in the Chapel. You know that you are God's child. You feel God's presence. At this time all you want is to be with God. You still have nothing to say. Yet your heart is overflowing with God's love. Let's stop for a second. Possibly it is not the Chapel. Maybe it is the Nave. Or perhaps you are standing on the shore of a lake. Or at a crib looking at an infant. Or at a bedside at a nursing home. Or at a hospice. Or working

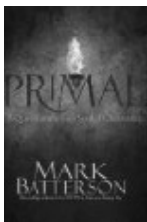
with a family member in the kitchen. All moments where you are speechless. Almost in shock. God is present. You have no words for God. But God knows. God understands. All you have to do is to be there for God. That is what Jesus did during his whole life. He was just there for his Father. Those times when we have 'nothing' to say to God may be the most blessed times of all. Like Jesus, all we have to be is just, simply, be. Then, like in Jesus' life, our words and acts will flow from those special 'nothing' times!

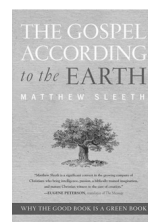

# Family Life and Spiritual Formation



I am glad to be starting the beginning of the Christian Formation year with you, instead of trying to catch up with you. First, you might wonder why I use the term “formation” instead of “education.” Over the years, as the people of God gathered in the church have matured, we’ve begun to realize that educating people in the Christian faith and tradition is easy. We send our children to Sunday School and Confirmation classes and send them on their way. Some of them come back as adults, and sometimes they even take some of the Adult Education offerings offered at the church. Christian

Education has very often been a static process. We learn the things our church or faith tradition expects us to learn and think we’ve got it. The reality is we never “get it.”

What we know about human, spiritual and family life cycle development is that it is exactly that: it’s about Development. . . constant change, constantly being formed and reformed in the image and likeness of God; constantly maturing in our thought process; and living in constant openness to what God will do with us in the midst of the changes and chances of our daily lives. God will only do this if we are open to it. God does not force God’s love and grace on any of us. Once we say “yes” to God, God takes complete advantage of that openness. The prophet Jeremiah tells us that God is the potter and we are the clay. If you’ve ever worked with clay or made pottery, you know that there is a lot of forming, pounding

down, reforming, and firing before the work is finished. So it is with God and us.

Highlights for the Christian Formation Year (aka places we deliberately are clay):

- Tonia Wallner, our Sunday School Director, will also be taking on PF. I have not seen anyone this pumped up about working with children and youth in a long time. Tonia brings new energy, faith, experience, and connection as she begins her new position. PF will meet generally on the first and third Sunday of the month. We will be getting more information to parents and PFER’s soon. I will be assisting Tonia with the Christmas Play.
- Barb Holtz and I are working on the curriculum and requirements for Covenant Class I and II. We also will be communicating with parents and students soon. Confirmation will take place on May 15th at the 10 AM service.
- Tonia and I will also be looking at and trying

on ways to integrate our children more actively into the life and worship of the congregation. Stay tuned. It’s going to be a Spirit filled and lively year.

- Couples: Save Saturday, November 20 from 9 AM - 1 PM for a Marriage Retreat Morning.
- Women: Save Saturday, March 19 from 9 AM - 1 PM for a Women’s Renewal Retreat.
- Barry and I will both be doing book discussions in the fall.
- The Board of Deacons and CE subcommittee are working on other offerings for Sunday Symposium.

The energy of the Spirit is indeed alive in this place.
