

The Definition of Love



A wise teacher of mine once told me that we can't really say "we hate" because we really don't know what "love" is. Love and hate are two sides of the same coin. Whether we love or we hate, we are connected to the object of that love or hate. If we weren't connected, we wouldn't have the energy to expend on either state. Love and hate are both words we use on a fairly casual basis. They are words spoken, used and abused in the culture that surrounds us.

According to numerous sources in the web, the word "love" is found in the Bible somewhere between 202 and 558 times (depending on the translation). The English word "love" has many different

meanings. It can have affectionate, benevolent, strong liking, romantic, or sexual (eros) implications. The Hebrew word *aheb*, most commonly used in the Old Testament, had a similar range of meanings.

Two different Greek words are translated as "love" in the New Testament, and they have more specific meanings than our English word "love." *Agapao* (verb) and *agape* (noun). This is the "Christian love" of the Bible. It means affection, benevolence, goodwill, high esteem and concern for the welfare of the one loved. It is deliberate, purposeful love rather than emotional or impulsive love. Almost all of the New Testament references to love are *agapao* or *agape* in the original Greek. *Phileo* (verb). This means to love in an impulsive and emotional way. It is seldom used in the Bible, in this way. Philadelphia is a related word meaning the love of brothers or sisters (e.g., Romans 12:10). It is often translated "brotherly love." (www.answers.com)

From the definition above, we can see that Christian love is about far more than romance, sentimentality, kindness or charity for those less fortunate. Christian love at its best is but a small reflection of the depth and steadfastness of God's unconditional love for us. This is what my teacher was talking about when he made the statement about hate and love. With our own best efforts, we can't come close to loving like God does. Words fail us when we try to describe our experiences, those moments, when we somehow are clear in God's love for us. And yet, God, revealed in Jesus, commanded us to love one another as he has loved us. Seems nothing short of impossible, doesn't it?


It seems to me that the only way we can begin to love, is to first let ourselves be loved by God. To be loved by God means to risk transformation, letting go and finding ourselves in uncharted territory... uncharted for us, but not for God. We cannot share God's love if we don't know something of it.

I don't know about you, but I like to know where I am going. I like my GPS. I am very intentional about when I use my GPS, making sure it's programmed, has a good signal and that the sound is loud enough so I can hear the directions.

Our spiritual lives are alot like that. We have to make sure we are tuned in, have a good signal and that we can hear. As Christians, we do those things in prayer of all forms. Just as I can decide with my GPS if I want to risk getting lost and go it alone, so I can with prayer and God. My experience, generally, is that going it alone, with my GPS or without God, is not a good choice. For God's love, the *agape* love defined above, to grow, we each need to choose, whether we will turn to God in prayer as individuals and as a Christian community. The reality is that this is not a one-time decision. It's an every day of our lives decision.

With Valentine's Day upon us, I encourage each of you to stop and observe how you use the words "love" and "hate"; if you spend time each day with the One who loves more than we can imagine; if you are or could be more intentional about spending time; and, if the risk is worth it. The people in the church, the community of Wauwatosa, our state, the nation and our world need people like us, to take the risk of being loved by God.
