## Building on a Solid Foundation Stewardship 2014

Since the Church's beginning, there have been over 170 stewardship campaigns. It is humbling to think of the people who entered into a covenant to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ and formed the First Congregational Church of Wauwatosa back in 1842.

In 1853, those same people purchased a blackberry patch from Charles Hart and constructed a foundation for the first sanctuary on the very site of our church today. Members donated timbers for a structure, and it was dedicated on October 27, 1853. A bell was added in 1855 - the very bell which continues to ring out from our steeple to this day!

Those men and women not only built a solid foundation for the new sanctuary, they also built a foundation for all those who entered into the sanctuary - a faith foundation built on the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

As Christ teaches in *Matthew 7:24-25*: "Therefore, everyone who hears these words of mine and acts on them, may be compared to a wise man who built his house on the rock. And the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and slammed against that house; and yet it did not fall, for it had been founded on the rock."

Rain and floods did come to this church: The Civil War, two World Wars, The Great Depression, The Cold War, countless trials and tribulations, and a post modern world that would declare that God is dead. And yet our church is still here... it did not fall, for it had been founded on rock. The solid rock of faith is in Jesus Christ - a solid foundation indeed!

And so the theme of this year's Stewardship campaign is:

### **"Building on a Solid Foundation"**

We strongly encourage you to pray over the Church Covenant that commits each of us "to return to God a portion of God's Gifts" and to carefully consider what this means as it relates to your estimate of giving for 2014.

Consider the words written in *Ephesians 2:19-22*: "...you are fellow citizens with the saints, and are of God's household, having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the corner stone, in whom the whole building, being fitted together, is growing into a holy temple in the Lord, in whom you also are being built together into a dwelling of God in the Spirit."

What an incredible foundation we have at First Congregational Church of Wauwatosa! With Christ himself as the cornerstone, countless men and women for almost two centuries have built that foundation into a dwelling of God in the Spirit. Now, in 2014, it is our turn to build on that solid foundation, building for the next two centuries and the rain and the floods that are sure to come -- so come on, let's get busy; there is work to do!

## AED/CPR Training Saturday, October 5

Several years ago, the Board of Trustees purchased an automatic external defibrillator (AED) for the Church. It is housed in the closet near the display case in the Atrium. Look for the signage the next time you are here!

At a recent Council meeting, there was discussion about how to use the device should a situation arise when someone in the building needs cardiac assistance. Those who were familiar with an AED explained that it was not difficult to learn. Upon further discussion, it was decided that First Church would offer instruction in the proper use of the automatic external defibrillator (AED) device and also how to perform CPR both with and without the AED.

# Congregational Influence - Then, and Perhaps Now



Historically, according to author Frederick L. Fagley, before the American Revolution, we Congregationalists were the largest church body in colonial America. We were the most populous and the most prosperous. We wielded wide influence in setting the ideals of this country. And, we worked to secure our country's political freedom. This is easy to understand since the first pilgrims had rebelled against the

autocratic power of both the English king, and the bishops. We Congregationalists united with others of like minds in the other colonies until all colonists united to win our political freedom. We now have the fuller growth of freedom which we enjoy.

After the Revolutionary War, the Congregationalists took a leading part in helping form our new government. Congregationalists knew democracy; they had practiced it for the one hundred and fifty years prior! Because of their experience, they knew both the weaknesses and strengths of democracy. Yet, in spite of its weakness, they found that men and women achieve their best only in the free spirit of a democratic process. In fact, Congregationalists believed that 'democracy was Christ's government.' From their religious beliefs arose their ideas of a free civil life. Their beliefs were embodied into our U.S. Constitution so that freedom of religion was made our law. Article VI of the Constitution provides that "no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States." Our Bill of Rights, Amendment I, states that "Congress shall make no law

respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; ...."

Our civil laws and processes have roots in Congregationalism's roots! As a result, in the U.S. we agree that every person has a right to freedom of worship. As to religious tolerance, we are also committed to accepting different religious beliefs and practices. In our country, we have almost, if not all, conceivable pious or religious traditions. People call God by different names, and people worship God through many different customs. In fact, with our constitutional concept of freedom of religion, we also have freedom from religion, so we also have atheists and agnostics. Much has changed in our country from what the earliest Congregationalists envisioned, because we live in a country of varied people and in a more diverse world than they could have imagined. However the principles remain the same: no civil authority may influence religion.

So... what do Americans do with our religious freedom? Has freedom to be told how and when to worship given way to freedom from worship? If we Americans were to draft a new U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights, how would they be worded through the lens of our current culture?

I was struck by the message of this wonderful piece I found in one of my files.

*“Wishing to encourage her young son’s progress on the piano, a mother took her boy to a Paderewski concert. After they were seated, the mother spotted an old friend in the audience and walked down the aisle to greet her. Seizing the opportunity to explore the wonders of the concert hall, the little boy rose*

*and eventually explored his way through a door marked, “NO ADMITTANCE.”*

*When the house lights dimmed and the concert was about to begin, the mother returned to her seat and discovered that the child was missing. Suddenly the curtains parted and spotlights focused on the impressible Steinway on stage. In horror, the mother saw her little boy sitting at the keyboard, innocently picking out “Twinkle Twinkle Little Star.” At that moment, the great piano master made his entrance, quickly moved over to the piano, and whispered in the boy’s ear, “Don’t quit. Keep playing.” Then, leaning over, Paderewski reached down with his left hand and began filling in the bass part. Soon his right arm reached around the other side of the child and he added a*

The audience was so mesmerized that they couldn’t recall what else the great master played, only the classic, “Twinkle Twinkle Little Star.”*

perform CPR serves as a bridge between the occurrence of the event and the arrival of emergency medical personnel. This may increase an individual's chances of survival.

We ask that you please sign up at the Gathering Table or call the Church office (414-258-7375) to register so that we have an idea of how many people to expect.

The Church Council voted again this year not to have the All-Church Program Meeting as set forth in our Bylaws. Beginning Sunday, September 29, and for the first several Sundays in October, Board Chairs will give brief reports at the beginning of each worship service to give the membership information about their work and goals for the upcoming program year.

## Toiletry Items Needed

Again this year, Circle 7 is making their annual appeal for toiletry and personal care items for a local non-profit agency, Tosa Cares. Requested items include: hair accessories, dental supplies, soap, laundry detergent, shampoo, tissue, toilet paper, and Band-Aids.
