### THE PENTATEUCH (FIVE-VOLUMED BOOK)

- . Jews and Christians refer to the first five books of the Bible as the Pentateuch
  - . These books are best studied as a continuous narrative from Creation through to the completion of the 40 years of Israelite wandering in the Sinai
- . Breakdown of our study of the Pentateuch
  - . Primeval history Genesis 1:1 11:26
  - . Patriarchal history Genesis 11:27 50:26
  - . Divine redemption and deliverance from Egypt Exodus 1-18
  - . Israel at Sinai Exodus 19 Leviticus 27
  - . The march toward Canaan Numbers
  - . Moses final days Deuteronomy
- . Authorship of the Pentateuch two schools of thought
  - . Moses
    - . Long held traditional view amongst Jews and Christians
    - . The Bible itself suggests Mosaic authorship of Genesis
    - . Christ references Moses as the author of these five books
      - . Mark 12:26
  - . The multi-authorship theory
    - . Over the last 300 years, some biblical scholars have developed the theory of four possible underlying sources behind the Pentateuch
      - . J (the Jahweh/Yahweh Source)
      - . E (the Elohim Source)
      - . D (the Deuteronomic Source)
      - . P (the Priestly Source)
    - . Each of the sources is thought to have its own characteristics and its own Theology
      - . Often times they will contradict each other
      - . This theory looks at the Pentateuch as a patchwork of stories
    - . This theory has never been supported by conclusive evidence
  - . The Bible has but one true author, God 2 Timothy 3:16-17
    - . The (human authors of scriptures) spoke from God as if they were carried along by the Holy Spirit 2 Peter 1:20-21

#### **MOSES**

- . The story of Moses is told in the last four books of the Pentateuch
- . Moses is referred to 700 times throughout scripture 783 36

- . Born of Hebrew parents (Levites), Moses life of 120 years is broken down in to three 40 year segments
  - . First 40 years living as a member of Egyptian royalty being educated and molded according to Egyptian culture
  - . Next 40 years in the Sinai wilderness being molded by God
  - . Last 40 years leading the Israelites through the wilderness
- . Character of Moses
  - . Faith the first of his outstanding characteristics Hebrews 11:24-28
    - . It required faith to make the costly personal choices he made
    - . It required faith to continue to trust God when circumstances seemed against him
  - . Prayerfulness
    - . Moses was a man of great prayer who turned to God in time of need
      - . He prayed while trapped between the waters of the Red Sea
      - . He prayed when his people rebelled against him in the desert
      - . One of the greatest prayers in all of scripture is when he prayed for his people and offered to forfeit his own salvation Exodus 32:3-32
  - . Humility
    - . Moses was a humble (meek) man, who choose not to use power and prestige to rise in position
    - . When attacked, instead of physically defending himself, he laid the matter before God and waited for God's vindication
  - . Courage
    - . Moses courage is best exemplified by his interaction with Pharaoh
      - . Moses did not fear standing up to the most powerful human on the planet at that time
    - . Moses did not start out as a man of great courage, but learned these things as he walked with God

# THE LAND OF EGYPT AT THE TIME OF MOSES

- . Egyptian chronology
  - . Egyptian chronologies list thirty/thirty-one dynasties from the early beginnings (opinion ranges from 5500BC 3100BC) to Greek domination (332 -323BC)

. The Early Period and Old Kingdom – Dynasties 1-6

. During this period the great pyramids were built

. The Pharaohs reigned from Memphis and had unlimited control 3.6 1.81

. The First Intermediate Period – Dynasties 7-10

. Period of upheaval when local rulers gained power at the expense of central government

. The Middle Kingdom - Dynasties 11-14

. Period in which country is ruled from Thebes, several hundred miles south of Memphis

. Literature and arts flourished

. The Second Intermediate Period – Dynasties 15-17

. Egypt ruled by invading people, known as the Hyksos (chiefs of foreign lands)

### .Long thought that this is when the Israelites entered Egypt

. The New Kingdom and the Rameside Period – Dynasties 18-20

. Beginning of the period of greatest Egyptian influence

. Empire spread to Euphrates River

. Period of the Exodus

. Two theories as to the actual date

. 1446BC – based on 1 Kings 6:1

. 1290BC – based on mention of Rameses in Exodus 1:11

. The Period of Decline - Dynasties 20-24

. The Late Period - Dynasties 25-26

. The Persian Period – Dynasties 27-30

#### . Egypt at the time of Moses

- . Fertile
  - . The Nile ran through the heart of the empire
    - . The Nile overflowed its banks every year, depositing rich new layers of topsoil
    - . Rich soil, abundance of water, ideal temperatures made Egypt an extremely fertile growing area
  - . The Egyptian fields produced two fertile crops every year
- . Wealthy
  - . Egypt was rich in natural resources
    - . Abundance of fish and game
    - . Delta region rich in Papyrus, providing fiber for paper, baskets. Clothing
    - . River mud provided an inexhaustible supply of clay
    - . Sandstone and limestone for buildings
    - . Copper and gold for weaponry, jewelry and barter
- . Well protected
  - . No natural enemies because of desert borders
- . Sophisticated
  - . Literature hieroglyphic texts date back 1000 years before Moses
  - . Fine Arts culture excelled in art and music

- . Science and Mathematics engineering skills held in awe today
  - . The Great Pyramid of Gaza was 1000 years old at the time of Moses
  - . The square base of the pyramid was 13 acres in size and reached a height of 481 ft. (roughly 32 stories)
  - . Pyramid contains approx. 2.5 million blocks, each weighing more than 2 tons
- . Pagan culture
  - . Despite the sophistication, Egypt may have been the most ignorant and polytheistic nation of the ancient world Romans 1:21-23
  - . Gods were depicted as animals: bulls, birds and snakes
