# LESSON 10: EXODUS 19 & 20 SEPTEMBER 7, 2011

### PREPARATION FOR THE GIVING OF THE LAW - EXODUS 19

- . The book of Exodus is divided in to two equal parts
  - . The deliverance Exodus 1-18
    - . The first eighteen chapters of Exodus deal with the actual events of the Exodus and the journey to Mt. Sinai
  - . The Law Exodus 19-40
    - . The last twenty-one chapters of Exodus deal with receiving of the moral, civil and ceremonial laws
      - . The moral law Exodus 19-20
      - . The civil law Exodus 21-24
      - . The ceremonial law Exodus 25-40
- . The Israelites prepare themselves for the receiving of the law Exodus 19
  - . The Israelites physically arrive at Mt. Sinai Exodus 19:1-2
  - . The Lord asks the Israelites if they are willing to enter in to a covenant with Him and they respond yes Exodus 19:3-8
  - . There is a three day period of ceremonial cleansing and consecration Exodus 19:9-15
  - . God lays down limits to accessing the mountain and having direct interaction with Him Exodus 19:16-25
  - . The preparation stressed first, the holiness of God and second, the need for holiness on the part of the people
    - . "Be Holy because I am holy" Leviticus 11:44-45

## **OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD – EXODUS 20:1-11**

- . "You shall have no other gods before me" Exodus 20:3
  - . We need to make God #1 in our lives
  - . God will not accept anything less than first place in our hearts
  - . God makes it very clear throughout scripture that there is but one God and He speaks with absolute authority

- . Syncretism pulling a lot of divergent things together to try to make a whole out of them
  - . We try to honor God while living in a world that wants to move away from Him
  - . In our effort to get along in this world, we try to blend in and thus diminish the uniqueness of God
  - . If not careful we end up with a syncretism Christianity where God is no longer #1
- . Sensualism allowing our senses to so dominate us that we push aside the truth becoming purely sensual people
  - . Our senses allow us to interact with the world around us
  - . Our senses were not designed to deal with the heavenly realm
  - . Faith does not engage the senses
  - . Faith forces us to deal with something greater than our sense, the One who gave us our senses
- . "How long will you waiver between two opinions" I Kings 18:21
  - . A healthy relationship with God begins by putting Him in His rightful place #1
- . "You shall not worship false idols" Exodus 20:4-6
  - The second commandment builds on the first by saying you may be worshipping the one true God, but in a false manner through false idols
    - . The fundamental rule here is never represent the Creator by anything Created
      - . Not only should you not make idols, you shall not bow down to them and worship them
  - . God is perfect any attempt on our part to create a physical representation of Him will fall short of His glory
    - . Any attempt to create and worship an idol is an attempt to reduce God in to our sensual realm where we can use our senses to reach Him
    - . Idolatry attempts to remake God into our own image
  - . Commandment is a reminder that our faith in God must transcend our senses
    - . "God is spirit and His worshippers need to worship in spirit and in truth" John 4:24
- . "Do not use the Lord's name in vain" Exodus 20:7
  - . What's in a name?

- . "Our Father in heaven, hallowed by thy name" Matthew 6:9
  - . The name of God represents the nature of God
  - . To dishonor the name is to dishonor God
- . "What is your name? . . "I am who I am" Exodus 3:13-22
  - . All of the many names we use today to reference God, have their origins in this revelation of God
  - . God has told us what we are to call Him and He expects us to honor it

- . How do we take God's name in vain?
  - . Vain without real significance, value, or importance
  - . To use God's name in any way that empties it of its true significance, is to use God's name in vain
    - . To defile God's name is the most common interpretation of this Commandment
- . "Honor the Sabbath by keeping it Holy" Exodus 20:8-11
  - . Why the Sabbath

- . A day of rest was part of God's original design Genesis 2:2-3
- . Reinforced with the collection of manna Exodus 16:23
- . For humanitarian reasons
  - . God recognizes that people can't keep going seven days a week
- . To show trust in God
  - . To sacrifice a day's wages or a day in the field requires trust
- . As a sign of the covenant
  - . "Demonstrate your love for me by keeping my commandments"
- . A needed time to focus on our #1 priority
- . When is the Sabbath?
  - . Is it Saturday, Sunday, or does it matter
- . Desecration of the Sabbath
  - . Total lack of interest in putting a day aside to honor God
  - . Obsessive observation of the Sabbath
- . How can we honor the Sabbath?
  - . God has given us a special day in the week that can look totally different than the other days
    - . Give thanks to God by using that day to sharpen focus on Him and what it means to serve Him, worship Him and obey Him

## OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH OUR FELLOW MAN – EXODUS 20:12-21

- . "Honor your father and mother" Exodus 20:12
  - . Why should I honor my father and mother?
    - . "It enables you to live long in the land" Exodus 20:12
      - . For most of human history, the family provided physical security
        - . Rural family provided means for food, work and safety
        - . A strong, well functioning family provided a better quality of life
      - . In today's culture a healthy society has, at its heart, a healthy family dynamic
        - . Where a family stands, a culture stands
    - . "It will be well with you" Deuteronomy 5
      - . A family unit where children are taught to honor their parents and parents are taught to be honorable enhances the well being of all members of the family

- . "It is the right thing to do" Ephesians 6:1
  - . God commands us to do, why, because it's the right thing to do
- . "You shall not murder" Exodus 20:13
  - . The key to this commandment is the proper translation of the Hebrew word "ratsah" which means murder, not kill
    - . This commandment doesn't prohibit killing in any form
    - . Deuteronomy 20 provides bible rules for killing in war
    - . Exodus 21:12-13 gives description of allowable killing
      - . Scripture delineates between types of killings based on motive
  - . God puts great value in the sanctity of life, and therefore, so should we
    - . To needlessly, or selfishly choose to take another life for our own personal gain is wrong
  - . Christ elaborates on this command by stating that murder is not confined to merely a physical act, but emotional as well Matthew 5:21-22
    - . "Anyone who is angry with his brothers is subject to judgment"
    - . "Anyone who says to his brother "Raca" is answerable to the Sanhedrin
    - . "Anyone who says "you fool" will be in danger of the fire of hell"
  - . Murder can be thought of as seeking damage to others, even if it never happen
- . "You shall not commit adultery" Exodus 20:14
  - . Adultery voluntary sexual intercourse of a married person with someone other than spouse
  - . Christ tells us this command not only deals with an actual act of adultery, but even the lustful longings of the heart Matthew 5:28
    - . "Anyone who looks at a woman lustfully has already committed adultery in his heart"
  - . There is probably no point at which the Ten Commandments comes in to more obvious and explicit conflict with contemporary morality than here
    - . Although people murder, steal and dishonor authority, culture still acknowledges it's wrong
    - . Modern culture, on the other hand, openly pushes for a sexual awakening that embraces any and all types of relationships
  - . The bible's standard is purity before marriage and fidelity afterward
  - . The sanctity of marriage is important to God and He knows nothing can destroy it quicker than adultery
- . "You shall not steal" Exodus 20:15

- . Societies, throughout the ages, have all condemned stealing, but only the bible gives us a clear answer why
  - . Our possessions have been given to us by God and therefore to steal from another is to steal from God
    - . "Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the father" James 1:17

- . A person can also be stealing from God, by hoarding his possessions and not wanting to share them with others
- . A lazy person can also be stealing from God, or from their employer, by not using the gift of time wisely
- . We can honor God, by honoring the property of others and by willingly sharing our property with others
- . "You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor" Exodus 20:16
  - . At the heart of this command is truthfulness
    - . "Let your yes be yes and your no be no" Matthew 5:37
  - . What does God desire here?

- . "Truth in the inner parts" Psalm 51:6
- . "Must put off falsehoods and speak truthfully" Ephesians 4:25
- . Honor thy neighbor by avoiding slander, gossip, and deliberate exaggerations or distortions of truth
- . If our hearts are filled with "self" we will always shade the truth for our own Advantage
- . We need to speak the truth in love as He did
- . "You shall not covet" Exodus 20:17
  - . This is the only commandment that deals directly with our inner attitudes and explicitly to the laws of our inner nature
  - . This 'law" strikes at the very root of materialistic western culture
    - . Our economy is built on inciting lust for as many products as possible in as many hearts and minds as possible
  - . It is wrong to want something simply because another person has it
  - . The further we move away from God, the more we covet to fill the empty void
    - . Our coveting nature can lead to other sins, adultery, stealing, and murder
  - . On the other hand, the closer we move to God, the more selfless our heart, the less we desire to covet
    - . As we grow in our faith, there's less of a desire for things and more of a desire for God
  - . The tenth commandment provides us with a good self examination for how obedient we are to the first commandment
